CONFERENCE OBJECTIVES

COURSE DESCRIPTION AND OBJECTIVES

The Abdominal Radiology Course has a new name! The annual meeting of the Society of Abdominal Radiology will now be called the SAR 2014 Annual Scientific Meeting and Educational Course. This annual meeting represents the Society's major educational endeavor, which brings together outstanding educators for a program highlighting:

- Use of new and emerging technologies in the imaging diagnosis of abdominal and pelvic pathology
- Problem solving for common issues in abdominal and pelvic imaging with practical solutions
- Extensive small group workshop presentations allowing registrants to individualize the educational content

This year, the educational course will be presented in conjunction with the European Society of Urogenital Radiology.

The course format utilizes didactic lectures, general interest presentations, panel discussions, technical displays and interactive workshops in a mix that optimizes the educational opportunities for registrants. The Scientific Paper Sessions of the Society will be open to all members. 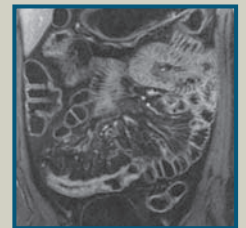


The **Dual Energy CT Hands-on Workshop** will provide registrants a dedicated lecture series and hands-on training on vendor specific workstations highlighting Dual Energy CT capabilities. Six 35-minute lectures will feature single and dual source Dual Energy CT workflow and applications to abdominal imaging. In separate sessions, registrants will receive hands-on supervised instruction on the post-processing techniques needed to utilize the imaging data for enhanced Dual Energy CT diagnosis. Registrants will have up to three hours to work through cases. Those interested in evaluating Dual Energy workflow will have the opportunity to work with multiple vendors. A certificate of attendance will be awarded upon completion.*

SEPARATE FOCUSED COURSE TO MEET EDUCATIONAL NEEDS IN **SMALL BOWEL IMAGING** TUESDAY, MARCH 25

The **Advanced Small Bowel Imaging Hands-on Workshop** is designed to provide a comprehensive overview of CT and MR techniques for the evaluation of small bowel disorders. World leaders in small bowel imaging will present the clinical rationale for and benefits of imaging, exam techniques and CT/MR imaging findings for a variety of small bowel disorders. This workshop will be highlighted by interactive experiences using the participants' own laptop computer. This training will begin with a targeted workshop track of six introductory lectures. In a separate afternoon session, registrants will receive 4.25 hours of hands-on review of case material with Q & A of cases and dedicated time for the participants to ask the panel of experts questions on technique and interpretation. Cases will also be available for independent review for the remainder of the week using a personal laptop or tablet. A certificate of attendance will be awarded upon completion. 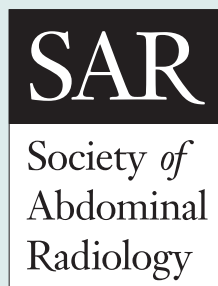
WORKSHOP INFORMATION

Workshop sessions will be offered Tuesday and Thursday in a small group format. The program offers 195 workshops covering a broad range of abdominal and pelvic imaging topics. **Continued this year is an Essentials Workshop Track: GI Topic – Luminal GI Tract and GU Topic – Urinary Imaging.** The goal of this track is to give the participant a comprehensive overview appropriate for maintenance of certification in GI and GU. Between the 2013 and 2014 meetings, 13 GI and 13 GU topics will be covered. For those interested in Ultrasound Continuing Medical Education, there are 11 workshops on Ultrasound topics offering up to 4 AMA PRA Category 1 Credits™. There are also six workshops on Dual Energy CT topics and six workshops on Small Bowel Imaging topics offering a total of up to 3.5 AMA PRA Category 1 Credits™ for each of these topic areas. 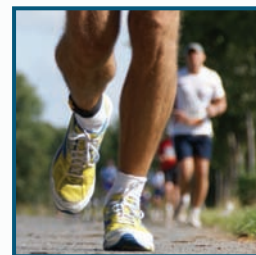

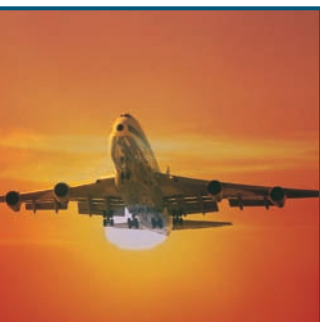

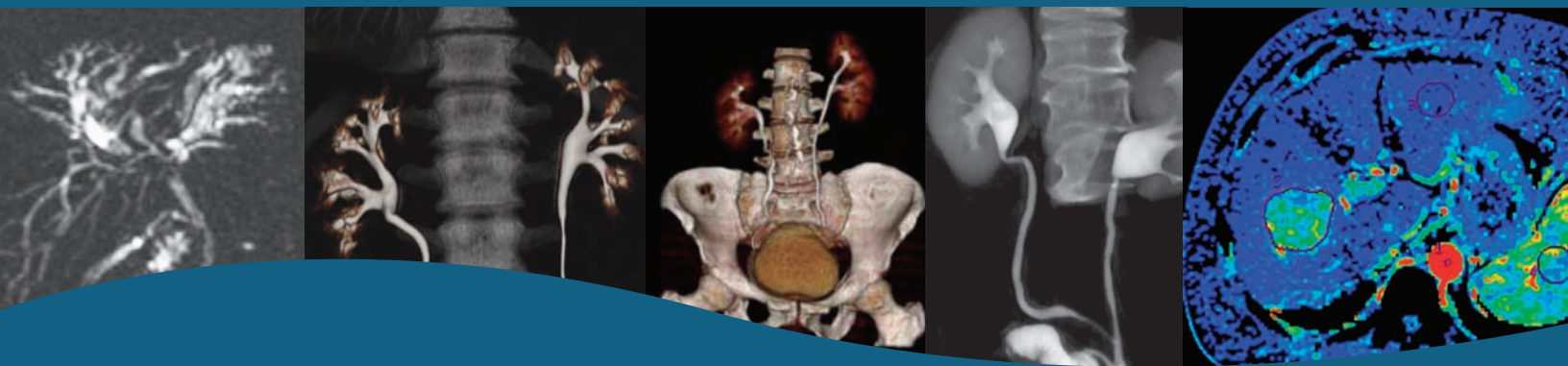
