



EUROPEAN SOCIETY OF UROGENITAL RADIOLOGY European Diploma in Urogenital radiology (EDiUR)

Aims and target group

The European Society of Urogenital Radiology (ESUR) introduced the Level III “European Diploma in Urogenital Radiology” (EDiUR). EDiUR is an internationally recognized certificate of level III radiological competence in the urogenital subspecialty, certified by ESUR, and endorsed by the ESR.

ESUR and ESR together are dedicated to continuously improving and adapting EDiUR in line with the European Training Curriculum for Radiology, level III, a living document subject to regular updates and revisions.

EDiUR certifies that the holder has reached a level III of knowledge and competency in Urogenital Radiology, in line with the level III ESR European Training Curriculum for Subspecialization in Radiology.

EDiUR provides a common European qualification for radiologists specialized in Urogenital radiology and will help to standardize training and expertise across Europe. It certifies that the holder has reached level III competences to perform, interpret and report imaging examinations of the urogenital system, and will assist its holders in the promotion of their skills and experience when dealing with other clinical colleagues and with the general public.

Target group

Candidates have to be fully trained, licensed and practicing radiologists, with a two-year Level III training in urogenital radiology. Level III training is a formal, full-immersion training in the subspecialty with rotations in prostate imaging, gynecological/obstetrical radiology and/or in urological/nephrological radiology. An active participation in a research program is welcome.

Candidates must be ESR and ESUR members in the year(s) of the application and examination.

Terminology

Successful candidates will be awarded the “European Diploma in Urogenital Radiology”.

Fee structure

The handling fee of the diploma is € 400. In case a candidate will not pass the EDiUR he/she will have the possibility to retake the examination one more time at a reduced fee.

Eligibility criteria

Diplomas may only be awarded to fully-trained, licensed, and practicing radiologists. The candidate is required to provide compelling evidence of this. For the purposes of this requirement, proof of practice is considered compelling evidence.

The training of candidates has to be in line with previously established basic principles of radiology training as laid out in the level III ESR European Training Curriculum for Subspecialization in Radiology.



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Key aspects of these principles are:

Full subspecialisation should only take place after the designated time for radiology residency, which should preferably last no less than five years. For candidates with less than five years of training only, proof of experience as a supervised staff radiologist is required.

Subspecialty interest training during the residency period does not of itself fulfil the training requirement for a diploma. At least two years of dedicated subspecialty training, including a minimum of one year following radiology certification, must be required by the certification programme

ESR and ESUR membership

The candidate must be a full radiologist or corresponding radiologist member of the ESR as well as ESUR member in the year(s) of the application and examination. ESR Members-in-Training are not entitled to receive a subspecialty diploma.

Candidates have to provide the following documents with their application form:

- Certificate of completed training
- RIS documentation or logbook with a total record of the candidate's experience in the respective subspecialty counter signed by the candidate's programme director (at least two years of subspecialty clinical practice/ training certified by the programme director are required)
- A letter of support from the programme director or department head
- CV
- Proof of ESR and ESUR membership in the year(s) of the application and of the examination
- At least 50 CME credits in urogenital radiology recognized by ESUR

ESUR will recognize credits obtained with participation of ESUR events (congresses, workshops, courses) and/or ESR events regarding urogenital topics. Credits obtained in any country regarding urogenital topics will be considered equivalent.

Relevant proofs of ESR and ESUR membership, practice and, for candidates with less than five years of training, experience as a supervised staff radiologist must be sent to the ESUR Office at least six weeks before an examination takes place. ESUR Office will oversee these documents and will forward to the ESR Office within four weeks before the examination.

Knowledge base

The level of knowledge requested from candidates has to correspond to the curricular contents for full subspecialisation in urogenital radiology provided by the ESR European Training Curriculum for Subspecialization in Radiology (Level III). Candidates will be examined on main aspects of urogenital radiology, namely diagnostic radiology of the kidneys and retroperitoneum, imaging of the male and female reproductive systems, prostate imaging, interventional radiology applied to the GU tract and safety of contrast media.

The different publications of the ESUR working groups are utmost important (<https://www.esur.org/working-groups/>) as well as the educational material suggested by the ESUR Junior Network (<https://www.esur.org/books-and-articles/>). A thorough



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knowledge of all the ESUR guidelines and position papers of the last 20 years is expected. PI-RADS, PI-RR, VI-RADS and O-RADS scoring systems must be well known. FIGO and

TNM classifications of urogenital tumors do not need to be memorized in detail, but the features or measurements with major clinical implications (e.g. parametrial invasion or 4cm threshold in cervical cancer staging) are most relevant.

Frequency

The examination takes place once a year.

Examination structure

All candidates will have the same examination conditions, equipment and the same length of time to complete the exam, with the exception of candidates with special needs. The exam will be held in English. The examination tests knowledge, skills and competence in UG radiology in three components:

1. 20 multiple choice questions (MCQs) (40 minutes): written part (30 points)
2. 10 short cases (each with 2–5 questions) (45 minutes): written part (30 points)
3. Clinically Oriented Reasoning Evaluation (CORE): reporting of four cases (40 points).

Between each component there is a break of 10 minutes.

The cases for the CORE part will be presented in DICOM format and displayed with a DICOM viewing software. They will be scored according with criteria similar to those already established for the CORE part of EDiR.

Examination Committee

The composition of the examination committee is available on the ESUR website. The examiners are appointed by the ESUR board. They have to fulfill the following criteria:

1. To be ESUR fellows;
2. Are experienced urologists of recognized expertise
3. Serving/having served in the ESUR institutional activities, and/or being EDiUR holders

All ESUR members are invited to provide nice, challenging, tricky but reasonable cases for inclusion in the EDiUR examination. They can get in contact with one of the EDiUR jury members or with the ESUR secretary to contribute.
